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INTRODUCTION

MyETF Dow Jones Islamic Market Malaysia Titans 25 or MyETF-DJIM25 is the first Shariah exchange-traded-fund ("ETF") introduced in Asia and is currently the third largest Shariah ETF in the world by asset size. It is designed to provide investment results that closely correspond to the performance of its Benchmark Index i.e. Dow Jones Islamic Market Malaysia Titans 25 Index ("DJMY25 Index").

Structured as an ETF, MyETF-DJIM25 is a liquid and cost efficient financial instrument for investors who wish to get immediate access to the performance of Malaysia's Shariah equity market. MyETF-DJIM25 was listed on the Main Market of Bursa Securities on 31 January 2008. The stock short name and stock number for MyETF-DJIM25 are "MYETFDJ" and "0821EA" respectively.

The benchmark index, DJMY25 Index, is a market-capitalisation weighted index of 25 largest Shariah-compliant securities listed on Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad ("Bursa Securities"). Provided by S&P Dow Jones, the index is constructed and computed based on the robust methodology established by S&P Dow Jones in terms of investability and Shariah aspects.

1.1 Fund Name

MyETF Dow Jones Islamic Market Malaysia Titans 25 ("MyETF-DJIM25" or "the Fund")

1.2 Fund Category / Type

Shariah-Compliant Equity / Exchange-traded fund

1.3 Investment Objective

MyETF-DJIM25 is designed to provide investment results that closely correspond to the performance of the Benchmark Index. The Manager attempts to achieve an absolute value of tracking error of less than 3% between the Net Asset Value ("NAV") of the Fund and the Benchmark Index.

1.4 Investment Strategy

The Manager used techniques including indexing by way of full or partial replication and/or investing in certain authorised investments, in seeking to achieve the investment objective of the Fund, subject to conformity to the Shariah.

1.5 Benchmark Index

Dow Jones Islamic Market Malaysia Titans 25 Index ("DJIM25 Index")

The Benchmark Index is a market capitalisation weighted and free-float adjusted index provided by S&P Dow Jones Indices ("S&P Dow Jones").

The Benchmark Index was created on 18 January 2008 and constructed based on a reference value of 1,000 as of 17 January 2008. The Benchmark Index consists of 25 Shariah-Compliant securities of companies listed on Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad ("Bursa Securities").

The universe for selection of the DJIM25 Index components includes all equities in the Dow Jones Islamic Market Malaysia Index, an index comprised of Malaysia-based companies that conform to the methodology established by S&P Dow Jones to screen stocks for compliance with the Shariah.


2 MANAGER'S REPORT

2.1 Explanation on whether the Fund has achieved its investment objective

For the Financial Year 2021, the Fund achieved its investment objective to track closely the underlying benchmark index, i.e. DJIM25 Index. As at 31 December 2021, the 3-year rolling tracking error between the NAV per unit of the Fund and the Benchmark Index on both Price Return and Total Return basis were 0.11% and 0.13% respectively, well within the 3% limit stipulated under the Fund's investment objective.

2.3 Investment strategies and policies employed during the financial year under review

The Manager adopted a replication strategy to manage the Fund. The Manager used techniques including indexing by way of full or partial replication and/or investing in certain authorised investments, in seeking to achieve the investment objective of the Fund, subject to conformity to the Shariah.

During the Financial Year, the Manager tracked the performance of the Benchmark Index by investing all, or substantially all, of the Fund's assets in the constituents of the Benchmark Index in largely the same weightings as they appear in the Benchmark Index.

The Fund's NAV per unit has decreased by 10.11% to RM1.1571 from RM1.2873 in FY2021 tracking the weak performance of the general domestic equity market in 2021. The Fund had a good start to the year before the Fund's NAV retracing and reached its low of RM1.0770 on 14 December 2021 and closed the year at RM1.1571. Similarly, the Benchmark Index (DJIM25 Index) and Benchmark's Total Return Index (DJIM25 Total Return Index) has also decreased by 11.04% and 7.64% respectively. The difference between the performance of the Fund and its Benchmark Index can largely be attributed to the Fund's operational costs.

2.5 Review of the market

Market review

Global equities started the year with a positive note as the risk on rally from December 2020 continued into January, bolstered by vaccination rollouts, optimism on the new Biden administration's proposed stimulus plans as well as China's stronger than expected recovery. However, sentiment turned towards the end of the month on vaccine delays, new virus mutations and the economic impact from extended lockdowns. The improved global demand outlook fueled further rallies in oil, which also benefitted from Saudi Arabia's surprised production cut for February and March. Locally, the market ended its positive streak amidst a rise in the number of new Covid-19 cases, a state of emergency rule, and the beginning of a new round of nationwide lockdown to curb the pandemic. FBM EMAS Shariah fell 2.2% for the month to 12,871 points in January.

In February, regional markets were spurred by pick-up of demand recovery and expectations of reopening as vaccinations were rolled out globally. Global markets however sold off towards end February as US 10-year treasury yield surged to 1.41% from 1.07% in January, stoked by higher inflation expectations from Biden's USD1.9 trillion stimulus bill. Commodities had a good run for the month with both CPO and oil price rising. Brent oil price surged to USD66.1 per barrel, the highest level since January 2020 as US production was hit by freezing storms. FBM EMAS Shariah rose 0.8% mom to close at 12,979 points in February as Malaysia began easing lockdown measures and started to roll out vaccination program. March saw continual risk-off sentiment locally as US treasury yields continued to rise. Markets remained jittery despite Fed's reassurance that it will hold rate near zero through 2023. BNM kept interest rate unchanged and expects growth to improve from 2Q2021, led by rebound in global demand, higher public and private sector spending. FBM EMAS Shariah declined 1% mom to close at 12,848 points in March following the extension of Conditional Movement Control Order and slower vaccination roll out.

The US markets continued to scale higher in April on the back of stronger economy outlook for 2021 and Biden's proposed USD2 trillion infrastructure bill. A retreat of 10-year treasury vield to 1.63% by end April compared to 1.74% in March helped on sentiment as well. Locally. new Covid-19 cases began to increase in April after hitting the low of 941 cases on 29 March. New cases hit the high of 3.788 on 30 April. FBM EMAS Shariah gained 3.3% mom to close at 13.273 points in April. The US markets marked their fourth straight monthly advance in May as economic data such as lower unemployment claims signaled a sustained rebound. outweighing inflation worries. In Malaysia, new daily Covid-19 cases hit the record high of 9,020 on 29 May. With the stretched medical resources, these led to the government's decision on 28 May 2021 that the country will be placed under a two-week nationwide lockdown similar to MCO 1.0. FBM EMAS Shariah declined 3.8% to close at 12.773 points in Mav.

Moving into June. US markets took a dip mid-month from initial inflation fears and the Federal Reserve's hawkish announcement during the US FOMC meeting, before recouping its losses at the end of the month. Recovery was mainly buoyed by President Biden's announcement on a new infrastructure deal which fuelled a rally among major indices worldwide. Locally, the total lockdown nationwide came into effect in June was extended due to the continued surge in Covid-19 cases. The government also unveiled its National Recovery Plan comprised of a four-phase exit strategy from the current Phase 1 lockdown. Despite continued rising in Covid-19 cases, all three major indices in the US charted new highs in July as mega cap tech stocks and positive corporate earnings helped drive main indices up again. Locally, new infection cases continued to escalate and UMNO withdrew support for the Prime Minister. The FBM EMAS fell 1.1% in July to close lower at 12.049 points.

US markets continued to reach new highs again in August with the S&P500 posting a near 3% rise for the month. This came with the Fed Chairman Jerome Powell signalling no rush for tightening of monetary policy. Market was exicetd by the pass of a US\$1 trillion bipartisan infrastructure bill which will be spread over five years. Locally, the Islamic equities markets surged 5.8% in August to 12,750 points due to foreign buying on optimism that political concerns will subside following the appointment of Dato' Sri Ismail Sabri as the ninth Prime Minster of Malaysia on 21 August. More economic activities allowed in states under Phases 1 and 2 of NRP where half of adults are fully vaccinated.

Most global equity markets fell in September with US and Europe ending their winning streaks. Investors' sentiment was spooked by concern over persistent high inflation, slower economic growth, upcoming tapering by the Fed, compounded by worries on global supply chain problems and contagion impact from debt-laden property developer China Evergrande Group. On political development, the government and Pakatan Harapan leaders signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) on a bipartisan cooperation. The government announced the 12th Malaysia Plan (12MP), a roadmap for the country's development from 2021 to 2025 and set a target annual gross domestic product (GDP) growth of between 4.5% and 5.5% for the five-year period.

Malaysia continued to outperform Asia and EMs in October ahead of the National Budget 2022. The gain was driven by net buying by foreign investors on optimism that the Malaysian economy will rebound from Covid-19 impact, following the reopening of its economy. Malaysia lifted its interstate and overseas travel ban which was in place since 13 January for fully vaccinated Malaysians effective 11 October. The negative surprise came from Budget 2022 which introduced a higher tax rate of 33% for company profits that exceed RM100m, alongside a higher stamp duty rate on trades for the Malaysia's market. This partly contributed to the tepid performance in November, as local Shariah indices fell along with regional peers, which was reacting to the emergence of a new 'Omicron' Covid-19 variant. Swiftly designated a 'variant of concern' by the WHO. Omicron stoked fears of renewed public health risks and re-imposition of lockdown measures globally, as several countries placed travel bans on selected southern African nations. FBM EMAS recorded a 3.7% drop in November.

Moving into December, US markets rebounded off a weak November, ending the year near record highs alongside most other global equities as markets rationalize the surge in COVID-19 cases with the downward trending death toll. Both the S&P 500 and Dow Jones Industrial closed up 3.0% and 5.4% respectively over the month. The Fed announced its decision to conclude asset purchases by March through accelerating the taper of asset purchases to \$30bn/month as headline inflation accelerated to 6.8% in November. Similarly. Asian equities also rebounded as markets appeared less worried of risks from Omicron and remained confident of ongoing recovery and continuation of economic expansion. Locally, Malaysian indices outperformed regional peers with the KLCI and FBM100 rising 3.5% and 2.3% respectively. Despite concerns over the flood on corporate earnings and Omicron risk on reopening plans, the Malaysian stock market ended the final trading day of 2021 sharply higher with help from last-minute bargain hunting, well as positive reaction to the government's decision to extend the tax exemptions on foreign sourced income for individuals and foreign sourced dividend income for corporates for another 5 years (from 1 Jan 2022 till 31 Dec 2026). On commodities, crude prices fell by 0.9% over the three-month period due to Omicron fears which sent oil prices tumbling by 16.4% in November before rebounding by 10.2% in December.

Overall, 2021 was a weak year for Malaysian equity market due to the political uncertainties and nationwide lockdown in tandem with rising Covid-19 cases. The DJIM25 Index started well at the beginning of the year and retraced to its lowest level of 951 points on 14 December 2021 before ended the year at 1.023 point, translating to a decline of 11.04% in 2021. Foreign investors recorded a net sold of RM3.15 billion in Malaysian equities for the year. The Ringgit depreciated by 3.6% against the USD to RM4.165/USD in 2021, alongside the general weakening across emerging market currencies.

Market outlook

Global equities are expected to be supported by a positive macro backdrop as growth transitions back to trend. However, tightening monetary policy could cause some market volatility. Corporate earnings will continue to be supported by reopening as COVID-19 progresses to becoming more endemic while production increases as labour supply recovers. MyETF-DJIM25's constituents of big-cap stocks that provide exposure for investors into key sectors in both recovery/re-opening and structural growth.

2.6 **Distributions**

For the financial year under review, the Fund paid an income distribution of 2.37 sen per unit for the Financial Year 2020 (declared in February 2021).

2.8 Significant changes in the state of affairs of the Fund during the financial year

The Securities Commission Malaysia had on 29 January 2021 approved the acquisition of i-VCAP Management Sdn Bhd ("i-VCAP") by Kenanga Investors Berhad ("KIB"). Following this, the completion of the acquisition of i-VCAP became effective on 19 February 2021.

Further to this, a First Supplementary Prospectus was issued on 13 April 2021. Please refer to the First Supplementary Prospectus for further details.

2.9 Circumstances that materially affect any interests of the unit holders

There were no circumstances that materially affected any interests of the unit holders during the financial year under review.

2.10 Rebates and soft commissions

It is the policy of the Manager to credit any rebates received into the account of the Fund. Any soft commissions received by investment manager on behalf of the Fund are in the form of research and advisory services that assist in the decision making process relating to the investment of the Fund which are of demonstrable benefit to unit holders of the Fund. Any dealing with the broker or dealer is executed on terms which are the most favourable for the Fund. Nevertheless, the Manager did not received soft commissions from its stockbrokers during the financial year under review.





3.1 Details of portfolio composition of the Fund for the financial year as at 31 December 2021 is as follows: (contd.)

S&P Dow Jones performed quarterly review and rebalanced the composition of the Benchmark Index in accordance with its index methodology. The quarterly review had resulted in changes to the component stocks as well as the weightings of the stocks in the Benchmark Index. The Manager had undertaken rebalancing exercise in accordance to the changes by S&P Dow Jones to ensure that the Fund's investment would be reflective of the changes in the Benchmark Index. The stock inclusions and exclusions during the respective quarterly review are summarised in Table 1.

In terms of sectoral weightings, notable changes to the Fund's sector composition as compared to end-December 2020 was the decrease in Health Care from 33.05% to 18.5% due to the declined in gloves sector weighting in the Index. On the other hand, Technology sector recorded the highest increase in weighting during the period.

The financial assets at fair value through profit or loss ("FVTPL") of the Fund comprise only of listed Shariah-compliant equity securities and are valued at RM158,494,802 as at 31 December 2021

The valuation and existence of the financial assets at FVTPL is the key driver of the Fund's net asset value. Incorrect pricing of financial assets at FVTPL could have a significant impact on its net asset value and, therefore, the return generated for unit holders.

The Fund's accounting policy on the financial assets at FVTPL is included in Note 3(c), and its disclosures about the fair values of the investments held at the reporting date are included in Notes 4 and 19 to the financial statements.

Our responses

Our audit work to address valuation and existence of the financial assets at FVTPL includes the following:

- Understanding processes and controls put in place by the Manager of the Fund ("the Manager") and the third party service provider to assess compliance with relevant accounting standards and performing walkthrough procedures to understand the operating effectiveness of relevant controls over the financial assets at FVTPL:
- Testing the valuation of the financial assets at FVTPL as at reporting date by independently agreeing the price used in the valuation to the published prices by the relevant stock exchange;
- Obtaining confirmation of the existence of the financial assets at FVTPL as at the reporting date directly from the Fund's trustee; and
- Reviewing the adequacy of the disclosures on the financial assets at FVTPL in the Fund's financial statements

Information other than the financial statements and auditors' report thereon

The Manager is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the annual report of the Fund, but does not include the financial statements of the Fund and our auditors' report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements of the Fund does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

8.5 NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2021

1. THE FUND, THE MANAGER AND THEIR PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

MyETF Dow Jones Islamic Market Malaysia Titans 25 ("the Fund") was constituted pursuant to the executed Deed dated 17 January 2008 (collectively, together with deeds supplemental thereto, referred to as "the Deed") between the Manager, i-VCAP Management Sdn. Bhd., and Deutsche Trustees Malaysia Berhad ("the Trustee"). The Fund commenced operations on 21 January 2008 and will continue to be in operation until terminated by the Trustee as provided under Part 25 of the Deed.

The Fund is an exchange-traded fund that is designed to provide investment results that closely correspond to the performance of the Dow Jones Islamic Market Malaysia Titans 25 Index ("Benchmark Index"), regardless of its performance. The Benchmark Index is a free-float adjusted, market capitalisation weighted index representing securities of 25 leading Shariah-compliant Malaysian companies listed on Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad. All investments will be subjected to the Guidelines on Exchange-Trade Funds as issued by Securities Commission Malaysia ("SC Guidelines"), the Deed and the objective of the Fund.

The immediate and ultimate holding companies of the Manager, i-VCAP Management Sdn. Bhd. are Kenanga Investors Berhad and Kenanga Investment Bank Berhad respectively, both of which are incorporated in Malaysia. The ultimate holding company is listed on the Main Market of Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad.

The principal place of business of the Manager is Level 14, Kenanga Tower, 237, Jalan Tun Razak, 50400 Kuala Lumpur.

The financial statements were authorised for issue by the Executive Director of the Manager on 28 February 2022.

2. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES

The Fund is exposed to a variety of risks including market risk (which includes interest rate risk and price risk), credit risk, liquidity risk and reclassification of Shariah status risk. Whilst these are the most important types of financial risks inherent in each type of financial instruments, the Manager and the Trustee would like to highlight that this list does not purport to constitute an exhaustive list of all the risks inherent in a Shariah-compliant investment in the Fund.

The Fund has an approved set of investment guidelines and policies as well as internal controls which sets out its overall business strategies to manage these risks to optimise returns and preserve capital for the unit holders, consistent with the long-term objectives of the Fund

a. Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk includes interest rate risk and price risk.

Market risk arises when the value of the Shariah-compliant investments fluctuates in response to the activities of individual companies, general market or economic conditions. It stems from the fact that there are economy-wide perils, which threaten all businesses. Hence, investors are exposed to market uncertainties. Fluctuation in the Shariah-compliant investments' prices caused by uncertainties in the economic, political and social environment will affect the NAV of the Fund.

a. Market risk (contd.)

The Manager manages the risk of unfavourable changes in prices by cautious review of the Shariah-compliant investments and continuous monitoring of their performance and risk profiles.

i. Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk refers to how the changes in the interest rate environment would affect the valuation of Shariah-compliant instruments. In the event of a rising interest rate environment, the valuation of Shariah-compliant instruments may decrease, and vice versa. Interest rate, such as the Overnight Policy Rate set by Bank Negara Malaysia, will have an impact on the investment decisions of the Fund regardless of whether it is an Islamic fund or otherwise. It does not in any way suggest that the Fund will invest in conventional financial instruments.

The Fund is not exposed to significant interest rate risk as its Islamic deposits are short term in nature and have fixed profit rates.

Liquidity risk c.

Liquidity risk is defined as the risk that the Fund will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities that are to be settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. Exposure to liquidity risk arises because of the possibility that the Fund could be required to pay its liabilities or cancel its units earlier than expected. The Fund is exposed to cancellation of its units on a regular basis. Units sold to unit holders by the Manager are cancellable at the unit holders' option based on the Fund's NAV per unit at the time of cancellation calculated in accordance with the Deed.

The Islamic liquid assets comprise cash, short term Islamic deposits with licensed financial institutions and other Shariah-compliant instruments, which are capable of being converted into cash within 7 days.

i. Financial assets

Analysis of financial assets at FVTPL into maturity groupings is based on the expected date on which these assets will be realised. The Fund's investments in listed Shariah-compliant equity securities have been included in the "up to 1 year" category on the assumption that these are highly liquid Shariah-compliant investments which can be realised should all of the Fund's unit holders' equity be required to be redeemed. For other assets, the analysis into maturity groupings is based on the remaining period from the end of the reporting period to the contractual maturity date or if earlier, the expected date on which the assets will be realised

Financial liabilities ii.

The maturity grouping is based on the remaining period from the end of the reporting period to the contractual maturity date or if earlier, the date on which liabilities will be settled. When the counterparty has a choice of when the amount is paid, the liability is allocated to the earliest period in which the Fund can be required to pay.

Equity iii.

As the unit holders can request for redemption of their units, they have been categorised as having a maturity of "up to 1 year".

Reclassification of Shariah status risk d.

Shariah status reclassification risk is the risk that the currently held Shariah-compliant equity securities in the portfolio of Islamic funds may be reclassified as Shariah noncompliant in the periodic review of the securities by the Shariah Advisory Council of the Securities Commission Malaysia ("SACSC") or the Shariah Adviser. If this occurs, the Manager will take the necessary steps to dispose of such securities.

Opportunity loss could occur due to the restriction on the Fund to retain the excess capital gains derived from the disposal of the reclassified Shariah non-compliant securities. In such an event, the Fund is required:

- to dispose of such securities with immediate effect or within one calendar i month if the value of the securities exceeds or is equal to the investment cost on the last trading day before the effective date of reclassification of the list of Shariah-compliant securities ("Reclassification") by the SACSC or date of review ("Review") by the Shariah Adviser. The Fund is allowed to keep dividends received and capital gains from the disposal of the securities up to the last trading day before the effective date of Reclassification or Review. However, any dividends received and excess capital gains from the disposal of the Shariah non-compliant securities on and after the effective date of Reclassification or Review should be channelled to baitulmal and/or charitable bodies approved by the Shariah Adviser
- to hold such securities if the value of the said securities is below the investment ii cost on the last trading day before the effective date of Reclassification or Review until the total subsequent dividends received (if any) and the market price of the securities is equal to the cost of investment at which time disposal has to take place within one calendar month, excess capital gains (if any) from the disposal of the securities should be channelled to baitulmal and/or charitable bodies approved by the Shariah Adviser: or
- to dispose of such securities at a price lower than the investment cost which will iii result in a decrease in the Fund's value

Regulatory reportings e.

It is the Manager's responsibility to ensure full compliance of all requirements under the SC Guidelines. Any breach of any such requirement has been reported in the mandatory reporting to Securities Commission Malaysia on a quarterly basis.

Basis of accounting a.

The financial statements of the Fund have been prepared in accordance with Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards ("MFRS") as issued by the Malaysian Accounting Standards Board ("MASB") and International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB").

Basis of accounting (contd.) a.

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except as disclosed in the accounting policies below.

Financial instruments c.

Financial assets and liabilities are recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instruments.

i. Initial recognition

The classification of financial instruments at initial recognition depends on their contractual terms and the business model for managing the instruments, as described in Notes 3(c)(ii) and (iii).

C. Financial instruments (contd.)

ii. Measurement categories of financial assets and liabilities

The Fund classifies all of its financial assets based on the business model for managing the assets and the asset's contractual terms, measured at either:

- Amortised cost
- Fair value through other comprehensive income, and
- Fair value through profit or loss.

The Fund may designate financial instruments at FVTPL. if so doing eliminates or significantly reduces measurement or recognition inconsistencies.

Financial assets are initially measured at their fair values plus, except in the case of financial assets recorded at FVTPL. transaction costs.

The Fund's other financial assets include cash at banks, short term Islamic deposits, trade receivables and other receivables.

Financial liabilities are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into and the definitions of a financial liability. Financial liabilities are classified as either financial liabilities at FVTPL or other financial liabilities

The Fund's other financial liabilities include trade payables and other payables.

Other financial liabilities are recognised and initially measured at fair values, net of directly attributable transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective yield rate ("EYR"). Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised, and through the amortisation process.

iii. Due from banks, short term Islamic deposits, trade receivables and other receivables at amortised cost

The Fund only measures the cash at banks, short term Islamic deposits, trade receivables and other receivables at amortised cost if both of the following conditions are met-

- The financial asset is held within a business model with the objective to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows; and
- The contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and profit ("SPPP") on the principal amount outstanding.

The details of these conditions are outlined below.

Financial instruments (contd.) C.

Business model assessment

The Fund determines its business model at the level that best reflects how it manages groups of financial assets to achieve its business objective.

The Fund's business model is not assessed on an instrument-by-instrument basis, but at a higher level of aggregated portfolios and is based on observable factors such as:

- How the performance of the business model and the financial assets held within that business model are evaluated and reported to the entity's key management personnel:
- The risks that affect the performance of the business model (and the financial assets held within that business model) and, in particular, the way those risks are managed;
- How managers of the business are compensated (for example, whether the compensation is based on the fair value of the assets managed or on the contractual cash flows collected); and
- The expected frequency, value and timing of sales are also important aspects of the Fund's assessment.

The business model assessment is based on reasonably expected scenarios without taking 'worst case' or 'stress case' scenarios into account. If cash flows after initial recognition are realised in a way that is different from the Fund's original expectations, the Fund does not change the classification of the remaining financial assets held in that business model but incorporates such information when assessing newly originated or newly purchased financial assets going forward, unless it has been determined that there has been a change in the original business model.

The SPPP test

As a second step of its classification process, the Fund assesses the contractual terms of financial assets to identify whether they meet the SPPP test.

'Principal' for the purpose of this test is defined as the fair value of the financial asset at initial recognition and may change over the life of the financial asset (for example, if there are repayments of principal or amortisation/accretion of the premium/discount).

The most significant elements of profit within a financing arrangement are typically the consideration for the time value of money and credit risk. To make the SPPP assessment, the Fund applies judgment and considers relevant factors such as the currency in which the financial asset is denominated, and the period for which the profit rate is set.

In contrast, contractual terms that introduce a more than de minimis exposure to risks or volatility in the contractual cash flows that are unrelated to a basic financing arrangement do not give rise to contractual cash flows that are solely payments of principal and profit on the amount outstanding. In such cases, the financial asset is required to be measured at FVTPL.

Financial instruments (contd.) C.

iv. Financial investments

Financial assets in this category are those that are managed in a fair value business model, or that have been designated by management upon initial recognition, or are mandatorily required to be measured at fair value under MFRS 9. This category includes debt instruments whose cash flow characteristics fail the SPPP criterion or are not held within a business model whose objective is either to collect contractual cash flows, or to both collect contractual cash flows and sell

d. Derecognition of financial assets

A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a group of similar financial assets) is derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial asset have expired. The Fund also derecognises the financial asset if it has both transferred the financial asset and the transfer qualifies for derecognition.

The Fund has transferred the financial asset if, and only if, either:

- The Fund has transferred its contractual rights to receive cash flows from the financial asset: or
- It retains the rights to the cash flows but has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a 'passthrough' arrangement.

Pass-through arrangements are transactions whereby the Fund retains the contractual rights to receive the cash flows of a financial asset (the 'original asset'), but assumes a contractual obligation to pay those cash flows to one or more entities (the 'eventual recipients'), when all of the following three conditions are met:

- The Fund has no obligation to pay amounts to the eventual recipients unless it has collected equivalent amounts from the original asset, excluding short-term advances with the right to full recovery of the amount financed plus accrued profit at market rates:
- The Fund cannot sell or pledge the original asset other than as security to the eventual recipients: and
- The Fund has to remit any cash flows it collects on behalf of the eventual recipients without material delay. In addition, the Fund is not entitled to reinvest such cash flows, except for investments in cash or cash equivalents including profit earned, during the period between the collection date and the date of required remittance to the eventual recipients.

A transfer only qualifies for derecognition if either:

- The Fund has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset; or
- The Fund has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset but has transferred control of the asset.

d. Derecognition of financial assets (contd,)

The Fund considers control to be transferred if, and only if, the transferee has the practical ability to sell the asset in its entirety to an unrelated third party and is able to exercise that ability unilaterally and without imposing additional restrictions on the transfer

When the Fund has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards and has retained control of the asset, the asset continues to be recognised only to the extent of the Fund's continuing involvement, in which case, the Fund also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Fund has retained.

Continuing involvement that takes the form of a guarantee over the transferred asset is measured at the lower of the original carrying amount of the asset and the maximum amount of consideration the Fund could be required to pay.

If continuing involvement takes the form of a written or purchased option (or both) on the transferred asset, the continuing involvement is measured at the value the Fund would be required to pay upon repurchase. In the case of a written put option on an asset that is measured at fair value, the extent of the entity's continuing involvement is limited to the lower of the fair value of the transferred asset and the option exercise price.

e. Offsetting of financial assets and liabilities

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the statement of financial position if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis and to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

f. Impairment of financial assets

i. Overview of the expected credit loss ("ECL") principles

The Fund measures its receivables impairment using the forward-looking ECL approach in accordance with the requirements of MFRS 9.

ii. Write-offs

Financial assets are written off either partially or in their entirety only when the Fund has stopped pursuing the recovery. If the amount to be written off is greater than the accumulated loss allowance, the difference is first treated as an addition to the allowance that is then applied against the gross carrying amount. Any subsequent recoveries are credited to credit loss expense.

g. Income

Income is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Fund and the income can be reliably measured. Income is measured at the fair value of consideration received or receivable.

Profit income is recognised using effective yield method.

Dividend income is recognised on declared basis, when the right to receive the dividend is established.

The realised gain or loss on sale of Shariah-compliant investments is measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the Shariahcompliant investment.

h. Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents include cash at banks and short term deposits with licensed financial institutions with maturities of three months or less, which have an insignificant risk of changes in value.

i. Income tax

Income tax on the profit or loss for the financial year comprises current tax. Current tax is the expected amount of income taxes payable in respect of the taxable profit for the financial year.

As no temporary differences have been identified, no deferred tax has been recognised.

i. Unrealised reserves

Unrealised reserves represent the net gain or loss arising from carrying Shariahcompliant investments at their fair values at reporting date. This reserve is not distributable

Unit holders' contribution - NAV attributable to unit holders k.

The unit holders' contribution to the Fund is classified as equity instruments.

I. Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements of the Fund are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Fund operates ("the functional currency"). The financial statements are presented in Ringgit Malaysia ("RM"), which is also the Fund's functional currency.

Distributions m.

Distributions are at the discretion of the Manager. A distribution to the Fund's unit holders is accounted for as a deduction from retained earnings.

n. Significant accounting judgments and estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of certain accounting estimates and exercise of judgment. Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on past experience, reasonable expectations of future events and other factors.

i. Critical judgments made in applying accounting policies

There are no major judgments made by the Manager in applying the Fund's accounting policies.

ii. Key sources of estimation uncertainty

There are no key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

The Fund's objectives for managing capital are:

- To invest in Shariah-compliant investments meeting the description, risk exposure and a. expected return indicated in its prospectus:
- h To maintain sufficient liquidity to meet the expenses of the Fund, and to meet cancellation requests as they arise; and
- C. To maintain sufficient fund size to make the operations of the Fund cost-efficient.

No changes were made to the capital management objectives, policies or processes during the current and previous financial years.

21. SIGNIFICANT EVENT

(a) Impact of COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has significantly disrupted many business operations around the world. For the Fund, the impact on business operations has not been a direct consequence of the COVID-19 outbreak, but a result of the measures taken by the Government of Malaysia to contain it. As the outbreak continues to evolve, it is challenging to predict the full extent and duration of its impact on business and the economy.

While the Fund is not able to fully ascertain on the financial impact of the COVID-19 outbreak at the date of this report, it is anticipated based on initial assessments performed that there have not been any circumstances which would require adjustments to be made to the carrying values of the assets and liabilities of the Fund as at 31 December 2021. The Fund holds sufficient capital and will continue to prudently manage risks in order to ensure that it remains resilient through this period of uncertainty.

(b) Acquisition of the Manager by Kenanga Investors Berhad

On 26 August 2020, Kenanga Investors Berhad entered into a sales and purchase agreement with Valuecap Sdn. Bhd. to acquire the entire issued share capital of the Manager, i-VCAP Management Sdn. Bhd. for a cash consideration of RM11.5 million.

On 29 January 2021, an approval was received from Securities Commission Malaysia for the acquisition, and it was subsequently completed on 19 February 2021.
